- Develop and implement a strong Human Resources policy.
- Build membership and increase active volunteers.



Key Category #4 SERVICE DELIVERY

- Promote ARMS and ALLCO fish hatchery.
- Retain and increase environmental education and outreach opportunities.
- Build on environmental stewardship and habitat restoration opportunities by working with other groups and agencies.
- Continue to grow the Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows Adopt-a-Programs.



Key Category #5

ADVOCACY

- Promote fish passage at the Alouette Dam for all salmonid species.
- Strive to restore historical fish populations in the Alouette watershed.
- Monitor and influence Alouette and Stave system-related issues.
- Support collaborative, wholistic, ecosystembased watershed management approaches on BC rivers.
- Advocate for responsible development within the Alouette Watershed.



OUR IMPACT



29,654 students reached through environmental education programs in the last 10 years.



370 Adopt-a-Block volunteers currently contribute to a cleaner Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows.



21,053 volunteer hours contributed to a healthier Alouette Watershed in the last 10 years.



98 million salmon released from Allco Fish Hatchery into the Alouette Watershed by BC Corrections, Fraser Regional Correctional Center's inmate work program.



OUR VICTORIES



1993 - ARMS formed as a non-profit organization to, among other environmental issues, negotiate with BC Hydro for an increase in water flows to the South Alouette River.

1996 – Fin<mark>al agree</mark>ment reached with BC Hydro to increase flows in the South Alouette River, averaging 92 cf/s. This prototype Water Use Plan was the first in British Columbia.

2007 - Adult Sockeye Salmon returned to Alouette River after an 80 year absence.

2008 - Adult Sockeye monitoring program started at the ALLCO Fish Fence under the Alouette Water Use Plan.

2010 - 115 adult sockeye returned to ALLCO fish fence - the highest return to date (2020).

2018 - ARMS celebrates 25 years strong

2019 – Celebrated 40 years of ALLCO hatchery operations - over 98 million salmonid species released throughout the Alouette Watershed.
