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## **Morse Creek Connection Freshwater Initiative Project**



Reg Franklin Park in downtown Maple Ridge got a makeover this quarter and it all started with a community clean up with the Maple Ridge Adopt-a-Block on February 15th. 15 participants donated 30 hours of their time to pick up litter along the banks of Morse Creek and around the park. On March 25th and 26th ARMS partnered with the Lower Mainland Green Team and Invasive Species Council of Metro Vancouver for a two day workshop. 49 volunteers donated a total of 133 hours to remove 12 cubic metres of invasive plants. Participants used clippers and pure muscle to cut and pull Himalayan blackberry brambles as well as English ivy that had taken over sections of the park. Program manager Ashton Kerr explained the mandate of Green Teams of Canada is to build community and promote health, well being and environmental stewardship through hands on activities in nature. "Partnering together to run activities like this allows charities to support each others growth, learn from each other and bring more people together, increasing our overall impact on the community" she added. That same weekend 50 native shrub species were planted to build up the riparian area of Morse Creek, a nutrient bearing stream running through the park. "A wonderful work party collaborated between three great organizations over two days!" said Marissa, ARMS Watershed Project Manager.









## **ECO - Education**

### **SPRING BREAK ECO-CAMPS**

ARMS hosted two weeks of spring break camps themed "Newtons Survivor" & "Harry Potter and the Lost Horcrux". The first week, children aged 5-7 participated in survivor challenges based on Newton's Laws of Physics. For example campers learned about the force of gravity by trying to protect an egg from breaking when it was dropped. The second week 8-11-year-old campers participated in activities with their houses to find the lost Horcrux. Magic wands were made and a Philosopher's Stone obstacle course was attempted with much success. succulents were planted to take home and mysteries were solved! "These campers were real wizards at brain challenges and lightning fast when playing active games." Layla said, ARMS Education Coordinator. "Another successful spring break." said Dan Mikolay, ARMS Eco-Camp Supervisor "Our camps are fun adventures where kids discover, learn and make friends" he said. Five high school students volunteered over two weeks as camp leaders to assist with games, arts and crafts. This opportunity provides a great learning experience for youth working with children. The volunteers earned 30 hours each week towards their graduation.

### **Classroom Workshops:**

This winter ARMS offered a variety of classroom programs including Wildlife Habitat Building, Wild Water Cycle, Forest Explorers, and Night Creatures. Students got to explore themes including protecting native species, types of pollution in our waterways, how to identify an animal based on its tracks, and the adaptations of nocturnal animals. A total of 25 workshops were taught to students from Pitt Meadows to Mission. The most requested workshop was Wildlife Habitat Building, which was taught to 17 classes of students from grades 1-7. The students learned about chickadees, how to use a hammer, and each got to build and take home a chickadee house. ARMS was invited to the SD42 Ignite Indigenous Students Day where 80 grade 7 students had the opportunity to build a chickadee house! Spring classroom workshops have already been filled with over 70 workshops booked!











### **Adopt-a-Butterfly Fundraiser**

### **ARSRP: Alouette River Salmonid Restoration Program**

The work continues on the Alouette fish passage committee. Recently the ARSRP committee members met over two days at BC Hydro offices in Burnaby to participate in the 4th technical fish passage feasibility workshop. This workshop covered a number of areas including: review initial suite of alternatives (i.e., full life-cycle restoration options), review conceptual designs of short-listed fish passage options, review results of fish life-cycle modeling for initial alternatives, and discuss consequence table of initial alternatives and identify final suite of alternatives. From our discussions and learnings over the two days, our feedback will go back to BC Hydro to help inform our group on selecting our preferred options for downstream and upstream fish passage on the Alouette dam. There will be a 5th workshop in May this year to help us finalize our work on the technical feasibility of these options.


The Alouette River Salmonid Restoration Program and the scientific studies and monitoring programs that emerge from our working group is funded through the Fish and Wildlife Compensation Program (FWCP). The FWCP is partnership between BC Hydro, the Province of B.C., Fisheries and Oceans Canada, First Nations and public stakeholders to conserve and

enhance fish and wildlife in watersheds impacted by BC Hydro dams.





### **Become a Sponsoring Partner**


